Butte County Association of Governments Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) & Coordinated Transportation Working Group <u>Draft</u> Summary Meeting Minutes For March 06, 2008

The following minutes are a summary of the SSTAC and CTWG.

The Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) and Coordinated Transportation Working Group (CTWG) meeting of the Butte County Association of Governments was held at their office, 2580 Sierra Sunrise Terrace, Suite 100, Chico, CA. The meeting started at 2:00 p.m.

Item #1 – Introductions

Self introductions were made.

Item #2 – Oral Communication

No comments were received.

Item # 3 – February 19, 2008 Minutes

No comments were received. The minutes were accepted by the group.

Item #4 –2008/09 Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) - Call for Applicants

Staff identified the SSTAC terms ending June 30, 2008. Staff informed the SSTAC that a "call for applicants" notice was placed in the local newspaper for new appointments by the BCAG Board. Terms for the SSTAC are for three years. A copy of the SSTA application was included in the agenda packet.

Item #5 – Locally Developed Coordinated Public Transit Human Services Transportation Plan – Project Development & Workshops

Staff informed the group of the progress and schedule concerning the development of the Coordinated Plan. Staff informed the group regarding observations of public workshops held in Chico, Oroville and Paradise in which over 30 agencies participated. In addition, staff presented the delivery schedule leading to adoption of the plan.

Item #6 – B-Line Paratransit Application Process

The purpose of this agenda item was to inform the group that BCAG would be working to address issues raised concerning the length of the existing ADA certification process. A significant issue was the fact that not everybody who wanted Paratransit services was also seeking ADA certification. Staff indicated BCAG would be working the ADARIDE to determine a preferred approach while ensuring all data was housed at one location.

Item #7 – Spare the Air Week for 2008

Staff informed the group of the scheduled planned activities for the Spare the Air Week scheduled for April 27 – May 3, 2008. Staff said all fixed routes would be free to ride. Guest speakers were also scheduled to make presentations on select routes. In addition to free bus rides, saving money on gas, and learning interesting tidbits from the guest speakers, those who ride during the week would also be eligible for a prize drawing including a folding bike, monthly bus passes, and more.

Item #8 –Needs Assessment for the 2008/09 Fiscal Year

Staff presented the Transit Needs Assessment for the 2008/09 fiscal year. Staff summarized the process undertaken and presented the format of the Assessment. Staff indicated that testimony received suggested that the adopted definitions be revisited. Staff indicated that changing the definitions would be presented to the SSTAC at a future meeting.

Staff requested the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council support staff's recommendation to the BCAG Board of Directors to accept the Unmet Transit Needs Assessment for the 2008/09 fiscal year and find that there are no Unmet Transit Needs that are Reasonable to Meet. The SSTAC supported staff's recommendation to the Board.

2008/09 Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) – Membership

DISCUSSION: The Public Utilities Code Section 99238 requires specific membership to be represented on the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC). The purpose of the SSTAC is to advise staff on matters concerning transit and other transportation issues affecting people who most rely on public transportation. The SSTAC meet on an as needed basis throughout the year primarily during the annual Unmet Transit Needs process. The SSTAC is a direct advisory council to the BCAG Board of Directors. The term of each appointment is 3 years. The council members meet on an "as needed" basis approximately 2-4 times per year during the work day.

A call for applicants will be advertised in the local newspapers in March for terms expiring on June 30, 2009. Attached for information is the current membership of the SSTAC with the various categories identified.

BCAG TRANSIT UPDATE

PREPARED BY: Iván García, Programming Manager

DISCUSSION: The purpose of this agenda item is to provide the Council and Working Group with a B-Line Transit System update.

- <u>ADA Paratransit Application</u> The application form used by ADARIDE.COM for ADA certification was significantly reduced from its original length.
- <u>Bus Stop Improvement Plan</u> A Request for Proposal has been circulated to advertisement agencies. BCAG hopes to have new shelters underway by Spring 2009.
- <u>FTA Section 5310 Application</u> BCAG will be submitting an FTA 5310 grant to Caltrans for 6 new paratransit vehicles. Based on the criteria for funding, BCAG believes the funding will be approved. Approval typically occurs around February.
- <u>BCAG Ridership Survey Data Complete</u> Staff will give a verbal summary of the result of the transit ridership survey results.
- <u>BCAG Market Based Transit Plan</u> A pending grant application is awaiting a decision by Caltrans whether or not funding will be approved. BCAG hopes to have a decision soon after the state budget is approved.
- <u>New Fixed Route Buses</u> 8 New 40' Orion CNG Buses have arrived and will be in full service by the end of the month.
- <u>Paratransit Fleet Electronic Fareboxes</u> BCAG intends to equip the paratransit fleet of vehicles with the same type of electronic fareboxes as fixed route in the 2008/09 fiscal year.

- <u>Chico Bike Map Complete</u> Reflects bike paths including highlighted transit routes. Maps are available at all local bike shops, the Chico Municipal Center and the BCAG offices.

APPROVED 2008/09 COORDINATED PUBLIC TRANSIT – HUMAN SERVICES TRANSPORTATION PLAN FOR BUTTE COUNTY

PREPARED BY: Kristy Bonnifet, Assistant Planner

ISSUE: BCAG is required to prepare and adopt a Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan by the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) legislation, in order to be eligible for certain FTA funding.

DISCUSSION: Projects funded with FTA Section 5310 (Elderly Persons & Persons with Disabilities), 5316 (Job Access and Reverse Commute) or 5317 (New Freedom) programs must be derived from a Coordinated Plan. BCAG's 2008/09 "Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan" meets these requirements for funding eligibility under SAFETEA-LU. Funds available under the SAFETEA-LU programs are matched by local human service resources and other funding to leverage more transportation for targeted individuals.

The overall goal of the Plan is to identify and prioritize projects eligible for Federal funding to address transportation needs of 1) persons of low income, 2) persons with disabilities and 3) seniors.

The Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan was approved by the BCAG Board of Directors at the July Board meeting. Approval of the plan was required in order to remain eligible for grant funding opportunities for the 2008/09 fiscal year. The Draft Plan was made available to interested parties by email for review and comment prior to Board approval. The BCAG Board may amend the draft plan at any time. Minor comments were received to include the Gridley Golden Feather Flyer paratransit service. Comments received from Gridley have been incorporated into the Plan. No additional comments were received.

Table 8-2 of the Coordinated Plan is a matrix that presents the coordinated goals in relation to guiding objectives and the possible strategies by which those objectives can be implemented. The Coordinated Plan does not identify specific projects. So long as the proposed project is consistent with the attached Table 8-2, the project will be eligible for FTA Sections 5310, 5316 and 5317 funding.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: None. This item is presented for information only.

2008 Regional Transportation Plan Development

ISSUE: BCAG is required to adopt a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) every 4 years to identify the region's long-range transportation plan for a 20 year minimum horizon.

DISCUSSION: The purpose of the RTP is to identify BCAG's transportation project priorities for all modes of transportation over the next 27-years through 2035. The RTP then serves as the foundation for developing the future Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP document) and the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP document). The RTP can be amended at any time by the BCAG Board of Directors.

Staff has completed the draft RTP document and air quality conformity analysis and determination for review and comment. In addition, a public review draft of the Environmental Impact Report is expected to be completed by the end of September.

The RTP has been distributed to all Butte County Public Libraries, each of the cities and County, each of the Butte County Rancherias, Caltrans, FHWA, FTA, EPA, Butte County Air Quality Management District and posted on BCAG's website at <u>www.bcag.org</u>. A notice on the development of the RTP was also sent to an extensive list of potential interest groups provided by Caltrans. A public notice has been placed in the local newspaper as well. Various public workshops were held early in the development of the RTP and throughout the process.

The RTP was developed in consultation with the BCAG Transportation Advisory Committee which includes each of the cities and County, Butte County Rancherias, citizen representatives, BCAQMD and Caltrans. In addition, staff held two Interagency Consultation Review meetings with the Air District, Caltrans, FHWA and the EPA to ensure BCAG was appropriately addressing the regional emission analysis requirements. The attached table summarizes the regional STIP priorities included in the Plan that are within BCAG's financial projections.

UNMET TRANSIT NEEDS DEFINITIONS

PREPARED BY: Ivan Garcia, Programming Manager

ISSUE: BCAG has been requested to review the current adopted definitions of an "Unmet Transit Need" and "Reasonable to Meet" used in the development of the annual Unmet Transit Needs Assessment.

BACKGROUND: Transportation Development Act (TDA) law requires BCAG to adopt the definitions for the terms "unmet transit needs" and "reasonable to meet". These definitions were adopted by the Butte County Association of Governments on April 21, 1994 and amended per recommendation of the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council on October 23, 2003. In making a finding on whether or not an unmet need is reasonable to meet, BCAG conducts analysis of all four evaluation criteria listed below.

Unmet Transit Needs Definition

Unmet transit needs are those trips required, but currently not provided, and not scheduled to be provided within Butte County, for individuals dependent on public transit to maintain a minimum standard of living.

Reasonable to Meet Definition

Reasonable to meet shall include all of the following factors:

- 1. Cost Effectiveness: The cost to provide the service will meet the minimum farebox recovery ratio.
- 2. Economy: The project can be implemented at reasonable cost.
- 3. Community Acceptance: Support exists, indicated through the public hearing process.
- 4. Operational Feasibility: The service must be safe to operate.

Possible Findings for Unmet Transit Needs Process by Board of Directors

The Transportation Development Act Section 99401.5(d) states that the Board shall make one of the following findings:

- 1. There are no unmet transit needs;
- 2. There are no unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet;
- 3. There are unmet transit needs, including needs that are reasonable to meet.

Comments that are NOT defined as an "Unmet Need"

Testimony in the following areas, by definition are **not** considered **unmet transit needs**. They may be legitimate concerns and/or comments and will be directed toward the appropriate departments for further consideration.

- 1. More bus shelters
- 2. Equipment issues (i.e. more bicycle racks, new vehicles, fareboxes)
- 3. Minor route modifications and/or modifications made for convenience
- 4. Connections outside the County
- 5. More frequent service

Analysis Requirements and Assumptions

The farebox ratio is the ratio of fares to operating costs for transit service. Farebox ratio for urban fixed route is 20%. For rural fixed route and all paratransit services, the minimum farebox is 10%. These requirements are set by the Transportation Development Act. This is referred to as "minimum farebox recovery ratio".

DISCUSSION: Staff has reviewed other unmet transit needs definitions used by other agencies and overall, the definitions are similar. A hard copy of the background information surveyed is attached separately to the agenda.

As part of the 2008/09 UTN public workshops, it was suggested that bus shelters be included in the adopted definitions. Currently, staff is working on implementing a Bus Stop Improvement Plan in which an advertising agency would construct and maintain the new shelter in exchange for advertising rights to address these concerns. New shelters are anticipated for the spring of 2009.

In addition, BCAG has a pending grant application at Caltrans for developing a market based transit plan. Approval of the grant is subject to the state budget process. The purpose of the plan is to develop a comprehensive study on how fixed route transit service could be improved for the region with existing resources. As a result of the transit efforts for the 2008/09 fiscal year, in staff's opinion a better time to revisit the current adopted definitions would be after the 2008/09 fiscal year.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: No action is requested. Staff would like input from the Council regarding staff's suggestions.
